FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...





As we begin a new year, many people would have made resolutions to "do better" in the coming year. Among the resolutions, I wonder how many would have asked for the virtue of patience? We live in an "instant" society that has got used to having things done or given to us quickly, whether for example it is our food, entertainment or news. We get it so quickly that sometimes we forget that this isn't true of everything, especially of things that are of value or need to stand the test of time. Patience, like a muscle, becomes underdeveloped with the lack of practice. The famous Italian artist and sculptor Michelangelo, who took 4 years to paint the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel, said, "Genius is external patience".

About 170 years ago, another person also discovered the value of patience. An engineer by the name of Charles Ellet wanted to build a bridge across the Niagara River, which is a raging flow of water connected to the Niagara Falls. One of the problems was "How to stretch the first cable across the raging river?" If a boat tried to cross the river, it would be swept over the Falls, as many an impatient builder would have learnt.

Ellet thought of an idea – he offered a \$5 prize for the first child who could fly a kite across the river. When other engineers heard of his idea, they laughed at Ellet! How was this going to help build the bridge? But Ellet had the last laugh. A boy named Homan Walsh succeeded in flying his kite across the river. Behind Ellet's idea was a simple solution that relied on patience. Once the kite string was stretched across the river, he tied it to a thin cable and pulled that over. This in turn was then tied to a stronger cable to be pulled over. So, cable by stronger cable, the first real cable needed for the bridge was stretched across the river. In 1848, Ellet built the first suspension bridge across the 240-metre width of the river.

Charles Ellet certainly practised many of the Habits. He was proactive in looking for other solutions when the obvious ones did not work. He clearly had an end in mind and knew the first thing he had to do. He sought a win-win solution with children by turning his own challenge into a fun competition for them. If the other engineers had sought first to understand Ellet's idea, they might have been more helpful than critical of him. Certainly it required the synergy of many different workers to build the

bridge once the first cable was laid. However, underlying the exercise of the Habits was the conscious practice of patience throughout. You can't build the bridge without waiting for the first cable to be laid. You can't lay the cable without the slow tedious process of pulling other thinner cables in succession. If you do it too quickly or with the wrong cable, you might snap the line and have to start all over again. You can't have the kite line across the river without patiently waiting for someone wanting to do it. You can't solve your problem if you are not prepared to go through various ideas and work on them until one appears feasible. That will take time and patience.

So it is too if we want to help our children grow holistically and build their own bridge of character. We have to teach them to be patient with themselves and others, and we also need to exercise patience ourselves. Sometimes we may want the boat to cross the difficulty, but it is really the kite we need, because what we or they want for themselves is not always what they need. This poem by an unknown author reminds us of that:

> And God gave me Difficulties to make me strong. I asked for Wisdom And God gave me Problems to solve. I asked for Prosperity And God gave me Brain and Brawn to work. I asked for Courage

And God gave me Fears to overcome.

I asked for Love

And God gave me Troubled People to help.

I asked for Favour

"I asked for Strength

And God gave me Opportunities.

I got nothing I wanted.

But I received everything I needed."

Patience is truly genius.

Classes were scheduled such that they were engaged in either fun classroom activities such as performing a skit and dramatisation of the Habits and Values or Leader For Life games.




Our pupils at the Hives...

Learning Journey to Stratasys

STEM Inc collaborated with a world-leading 3D printing company, Stratasys, to pilot a series of 3D Design and Printing workshops for students. Our pupils were invited on board this programme incorporating Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) with the objective of enthusing them to be our scientists and engineers of the future by exposing them to the latest technology used by industries to solve real-world problems.

Primary 1 Roving Carnival

The P1 pupils were introduced to a healthy start with the Health Promotion Board (HPB) Roving Carnival. It is a one-stop "playground" with tactile and interactive exhibits specially developed for children to raise their awareness of the importance of leading a healthy lifestyle. The pupils were engaged in simple activities such as storytelling and a puppet show. Our pupils were also introduced to health topics such as nutrition, physical activity, myopia prevention, hygiene, mental wellness and oral health. The pupils attended a Hygiene Wellness talk, a skit designed to teach children the 8 steps towards hand washing, personal hygiene and good hygiene practices. The dental talk also taught the pupils the importance of taking good care of their teeth.

"Temasek Starts Right allows teachers to start on the right footing with their class. They take the time and effort to get to know their pupils. The programme also allows pupils to get to know their peers as they come from various classes. The activities outlined in the lesson plans provide ample opportunities for the teacher to bond with the pupils. The pupils get to see the teacher as a warm and caring person rather than just a person who delivers knowledge to them. Titled '**16 pieces**', this display can be used to showcase both teachers' and pupils' creativity and artistic talents.



Road Safety Matters

Our school seeks the cooperation of parents and guardians of pupils coming to and leaving the school. This is especially important as young children may not have the skills required to use the roads properly. Our children need to be educated on road safety rules.

The road safety policies of the school are as follows:

- 1. Reduce vehicle speed and stay alert for pedestrians in the school zone.
- 2. Cooperate with traffic marshals to ensure overall safety and smooth traffic flow.
- 3. Let your child alight only at the designated drop-off point.
- 4. Be advised not to violate traffic rules by driving recklessly or making illegal manoeuvres such as turning into the school from the outer lane(s) of the road.
- 5. Do not honk indiscriminately.
- 6. Remind your child to alight from the car as quickly as possible.
- 7. Reinforce correct road safety behaviour such as using the pedestrian crossing, and not jaywalking or using a mobile phone while crossing the road.
- 8. Remind your children to practise the kerb drill before crossing –"look right, look left, look right again, ensure all vehicles have stopped, raise your hand high up and cross the road briskly".

New enhanced security measures

The school requests all parents and/or visitors to register at the security guard post near the parents waiting area before entering the school compound. Depending on the purpose of your visit, you may be directed by a school personnel to the respective locations in the school.

- Fetching your child or if you have an appointment with a teacher General Office

Finance Matters

Pupils with financial difficulties may apply for financial assistance through the following schemes:

1. MOE Financial Assistance Scheme (MOE FAS)

To qualify for financial assistance, the pupil must be a Singapore Citizen and satisfy one of the following:

- Gross household monthly income not exceeding \$2,500.00
- Per capita income of the household is \$625.00 or below.
 (Per capita income is derived from the monthly gross household income divided by the no. of members in the household.)

Benefits:

- * 100% waiver of Standard Miscellaneous fees (\$6.50)
- * Free Textbooks and School Attire
- * School Meals Programme

2. Financial Assistance Scheme by the School Advisory Committee

This is given to pupils who fail to qualify for the MOE FAS. The nature of this assistance varies. It could range from the provision of free textbooks, or assistance in payment of fees or school-related expenditure.
